"Lockington - Lines in Time"

Hello again Everyone,

We have reached 1899, as we look back at the newspapers of the day to learn how people fared in our district, as the end of the Nineteenth Century approached. After having experienced a succession of particularly dry years, in June 1899, the residents of the northern plains saw floods. The abundant rain, which commenced falling, right across Victoria, in the evening on 20 June, seems to have been unexpected. It continued almost incessantly, until early on That day, the Melbourne Argus published a 24 June. statement from the assistant Astronomer at the Melbourne Observatory, explaining that the rain was due to a particularly slow-moving low pressure, which was blocked for a time by a large area of high pressure to the eastward of the continent, over New Zealand. This kept the rain belt stationary over the colony.

For most of the residents of our district, the downpour was received and recorded as "splendid," but others were affected by flooding. On 30 June 1899, the *Elmore Standard* reported: - "At the Campaspe Weir the regulators were torn away from either side of the weir, allowing a large quantity of water to spread over the adjacent country. The flood waters reached as far west as Diggora and Bamawm, and covered land hitherto unknown to be reached, even by the 1870 flood. Mr G Whinfield, of Bamawm, lost about 2000 sheep which were camped in a blind gully near Restdown." The Diggora West correspondent wrote to the *Standard* on 6 July that, due to flood damage, the road from there to Rochester had been impassable for several days. At Milloo, the waters of Bendigo Creek did great damage to the roads, as it spread over an immense area and made Milloo look like a lake. Reporting the situation on 12 July, the *Bendigo Advertiser*

calculated the cost of the damage at £500.

There was other news from across the district, mostly concerning illness or injury. The Bendigo Independent on 6 July 1899, reported that Miss Annie Slattery of Diggora was recovering from a severe attack of typhoid fever. On 22 July, the Bendigo Advertiser reported that a 17-year-old lad named Robert Buchanan, also of Diggora, had injured his arm in a shooting accident and, at Tennyson, Mr Charles A Yeaman's 3-year-old daughter, Flora Carol, had sustained an injury which necessitated the amputation of part of her In that same week, in Pine Grove, Mr George thumb. Greer's little daughter, Mabel Mary, had a lucky escape, when the horses shied, and she was thrown from a buggy. This was reported by the Elmore Standard on 4 August, along with the news that Mr Edward Whitfield was suffering from a severe attack of inflammation of the lungs. Better news appeared in the Bendigo Advertiser on 8 July 1899, where one read of the Bishop of Sandhurst's visit to Echuca on 6 July, to officiate when a group of young ladies were professed as nuns at the Brigidine Convent. Among them was Miss Mary Ann Dullard, daughter of the late Mr James Dullard of Pine Grove. Her name in religion would be Sister Mary de Sales.

On the wider scene, most of the news centred on the poll being held to decide whether the Australian Colonies would federate. The *Kerang Times* on 28 July 1899, reported that, while "in the big centres of the Colony some enthusiasm was manifest ... in the country districts there was little excitement." Up until midnight on 27 July, the result in the Gunbower Electorate was "Yes, 1,290; No, 107." In the Mandurang Electorate, the result as published in the *Bendigo Advertiser* on 28 July, was "Yes 1217; No 71." Milloo was the only booth from our area included in the Mandurang Electorate, and the vote there was "Yes 32; No 2." Local district booths in the Gunbower Electorate voted as follows: - Pannoomilloo ... 13-3; Pannoobamawm ... 17-1; Bamawm... ... 8-4; Diggora 15- 0; Terrick Terrick ... 9-0; Wharparilla ... 19-1; and Torrumberry ... 13-14.

The weather throughout August was generally fine and the crops showed progress, though some had been set back a little by frosts early in the month. Cricket was under way again and, as reported in the Elmore Standard on 4 August 1899, Mr Sam Windridge, the veteran cricketer, was making a recovery from his long illness. The Tennyson correspondent to the Bendigo Advertiser, reported on 4 August: - "The Echuca Shire Council has made many fine roads in the surrounding district by putting swamp cement on the formations. This binds together, and has the solidity and firmness of asphalt, and makes a road equal to any in Victoria." On the Tennyson social calendar, the Philharmonic Society held a function to honour their accompanist, Miss Beattie Elliott, on 18 August; and on 30 August, a concert was held to support the local school. Both events were reported by the Elmore Standard. Throughout the district, rain was needed again by September, as noted in the Bendigo Independent on 15 September 1899. This paper also carried notice of the death from influenza of Mrs E Oakey, of Grassy Flat. She, and her husband, Mr Arthur Oakey, had moved to Grassy Flat only recently after farming for twenty years in Milloo. Then, on 19 September, the Independent reported the sad death of Mrs Bridget Maloney, a very old and respected resident of Diggora, who had sustained fatal burns in an accident with a candle at her home.

The end of the year, and the century, was fast approaching, but there's more to recount that will need to wait until next time. 'Bye,







Hospital Rebuild Update

A number of structural defects have been uncovered which means the program of works schedule had to be revised.

The overall rebuild timeframe remains the same (December 2024), however the staging for completing various wings has changed.

REDHS assures the community there will be no interruption to our current service delivery whilst the works are completed, with all services continuing to operate from our temporary locations in Elmore, Echuca, Tongala and Rochester.

These changes will enable our aged care residents to return, and restoration of the Acute Hospital and Urgent Care a little earlier, but unfortunately will delay the return of Allied Health to Rochester.

A better deal for Murray Plains INALS for Regional Victoria

BLITZ IS A BUST COMPARED WITH PLETHORA OF POTHOLES: WALSH

The Nationals leader and Member for Murray Plains, Peter Walsh, says a Victorian government announcement of "a road maintenance blitz" could not be "more overdue and more disappointing".

Mr Walsh says if the government's idea of a maintenance blitz is the four years it has taken to announce the deadly Appin South turnoff on the Loddon Highway, "we are in for another long wait".

He says all the Allan Labor government has done is generate a few headlines for itself and it will then hope the issue drops off people's radar for as long as possible.

"Twelve months down the track and the government is finally acknowledging what we have been saying since floods hit northern Victoria in October 2022 – country roads have suffered the most damage, bearing the brunt of heavy rain and flooding during the past year," Mr Walsh says.

"As for its latest claims – that it will now sink \$6.6 billion into roads maintenance and 'future proofing' local roads – well, I would be fascinated to know where that money is coming from, or if it will ever arrive," he added. "It will be like promising regional Victoria the Commonwealth Games – before an election – and then when that was all over, announcing the government would save us a fortune by cancelling them.

"This Premier was the Minister responsible for the Games, just as she has been the person with her hand on the helm of the disastrous Big Build, which she has managed to botch completely to deliver us instead the Big Bill, billions and billions of dollars overbudget."

Mr Walsh says rather than a blitz, we need a clearly defined strategy, with a timeline and some sort of transparent accountability to ensure the public can see how much money arrives – and where it goes.

He says the government claims its most recent 12-month blitz included 370,000 potholes being patched and 21,000 signs repaired or replaced.

"But really, with numbers this big does anyone know what has actually been started and completed?" Mr Walsh asked.

"What I do know is everywhere I go in regional Victoria I have to bounce from road to road and town to town, and every time I stop, I have constituents wanting to tell me about their local potholes and deteriorating roads," he says.

"Regional Victoria doesn't want a blitz, it wants results, long-term results. And we want road maintenance, road widening and passing lanes. And we wanted it years ago, not potentially starting year."

Christmas Waste Changes – don't dismay, it's just one day!

There will be no Council kerbside collection on Christmas Day, Monday 25 December which means that from Boxing Day, Tuesday 26 December until 30 December, kerbside collection services will operate one day later than usual across the shire. Don't dismay – it's just one day! If your usual collection day is Monday, your bins will be collected on Tuesday; if your usual collection day is Tuesday, bins will be collected Wednesday and so on until Saturday 30 December.




