LOCKINGTON - LINES IN TIME

Hello again everyone,

In April 1903, as we look back at the early newspapers to learn how the people of this district were faring, there had been no further progress concerning the provision of a rail service, nor was there any significant development in bringing a reliable irrigation scheme to the region.

Though seasonal conditions generally met the farmers' needs, as recorded by the Bendigo Advertiser on 13 April 1903, "disagreeable weather" marred the Bamawm Methodist Sunday School picnic on 10 April, and on 4 July, the Elmore Standard reported that rain caused the postponement of the Band of Hope concert at Diggora, which was to have been held on 1 July.

Unfortunately, though the drought of 1902 was over, its effects were still being felt. Across the district there were stock losses. Mr William G Rigby of Tennyson lost six work horses that year, thought to be mainly due to the dry feed that they were eating. At Diggora, Mr J T Penny lost a valuable draught mare, the death considered to have been due to sand in its stomach and, as stated in the Argus on 31 March, there had been other such instances in the Rochester district. In this case, it was found that the horse's stomach also contained fencing wire and boot rivets!

At Tennyson, the Martin Bros and Mr Windridge lost store cattle due to the animals having eaten wild melon. However, bot fly was blamed for the loss of another horse at Diggora South in April and, according to the Elmore Standard on 4 July 1903, this same problem caused the deaths of several more horses at Diggora and Warragamba.

In the meantime, the crops grew well and at Tennyson, a new machine – a Cultivator – was being used extensively. Birds were causing trouble; crows and native companions [brolgas] were pulling up the young wheat plants at Milloo, to such an extent that farmers there were laying poison. In June, the farmers at Diggora also resorted to poisoning the crows, magpies and galahs that attacked their wheat crops.

It was not just the grain growers who were having troubles. 'Travelling sheep' ate much of the grass at Tennyson, and the

Warragamba Creamery experienced difficulty because few cows were being milked. Farmers at Diggora South expressed concern when the local station owner planted boxthorn hedges, which they believed provided a harbour for sparrows and, at Pine Grove, eaglehawks killed eighty full-grown turkeys, reared on the family farm by Mrs Joseph Chappel.

Still, as the Elmore Standard and Bendigo's Advertiser and Independent indicated at the time, the district residents kept their small communities functioning, mainly through events organised by the various church congregations. There were also dances and socials, like those being run in Kildeas' barn at Diggora South, and in the 'Old Mill' at Pannoomilloo. Cricket and tennis clubs thrived and attracted strong support.

There were several Mutual Improvement groups in the region, conducting regular meetings and contesting debates within and between groups. In early July, a number of Pine Grove residents gathered at the local cemetery to plant forty new trees, received from the Conservator of Forests - though there was some disappointment as 160 trees had been expected. On 2 July, as published in the Advocate on 11 July 1903, friends and relatives of Miss Mary Cahill of Diggora, celebrated her reception as Sister Mary Josephine into the Convent of Mercy, at Bendigo.

As the year progressed, changes occurred in the district as the centres of population shifted; farms changed hands, and families aged, causing people to move about in the district or to move away. On 6 June 1903, the Bendigo Independent noted that the Piavella Mutual Improvement Association had disbanded, their library books being purchased by the Milloo Mutual Improvement Society.

On 5 July, the Bamawm Methodist congregation celebrated the reopening of their freshly painted church whereas, on 4 July, the Elmore Standard reported that the Presbyterian congregation at Diggora, and the other congregations involved, had agreed to move the Diggora Presbyterian Church to a position where it would be closer to worshippers at Tennyson and Warragamba.

However, a proposal to merge the State Schools at Milloo, Milloo East, Wanurp and Tennyson, put forward in August by the Education Department, met with a very different reception. On 24 August 1903, as published in the Bendigo Independent on the 27th, a 'Monster Indignation Meeting' was held at Milloo, resulting in a document of protest being sent to the Department. [The schools were not merged.] On 1 September, the Piavella Post Office was relocated to the local school, and the Milloo Post Office closed.

On the social scene, the Diggora West school concert was a great success, as was the St David's Sunday School Picnic, which took place on 19 August in Mr Forsyth's paddock at Milloo. Then, on 10-11 September 1903, the district experienced a new form of entertainment, when a "Lantern Service" was presented at the Bamawm and Diggora Methodist Churches.

As Spring approached there was a beautiful show of wildflowers. At Warragamba, the supply of milk to the Creamery improved, and Pine Grove, according to the Bendigo Advertiser on 21 August, enjoyed the "best dairying season for many years." A record harvest was anticipated, but October brought oppressive weather, followed by severe and widespread thunderstorms – 'the most violent ever' at Warragamba, according to the Elmore Standard on 17 October 1903. On a brighter note, on 27 October, the Warragamba school children enjoyed a picnic in a paddock near the Creamery, followed by a dance in Kildeas' barn for the young people of the district. And, on 28 October, the Diggora folk celebrated the marriage of Miss Annie I O'Brien of Diggora, and Mr Jack Hanley of Rochester. The harvest will wait until next time. 'Bye until then,

FOSTERVILLE GOLD MINE NOTIFICATION TO LANDHOLDERS


Air Core Drilling Program


In the coming weeks, Fosterville Gold Mine will commence an Air Core Drilling program within public road reserves in the Kamarooka and Milloo areas.

What is Air Core Drilling?

Air Core (AC) drilling is a rotary type of drilling, in which broken rock from the cutting face passes to the surface inside a separate tube within the drill stem using compressed air.

Where will the Air Core drilling program take place?

Why use AC drilling?

It is a relatively quick method of drilling where holes can be completed in less than one day reducing the period of disruption and potential impacts for land users and landholders. AC drilling utilises a smaller footprint and faster processes than alternative exploration drilling methods (eg diamond or reverse circulation).

What's involved in the survey?

You may see two trucks, one with a mounted drill rig and two light vehicles with up to eight people in highly visible clothing working along roadsides, within council reserves. The soil and rock chips are collected and removed from the site, and multiple holes may be drilled in rapid succession. The drilling footprint will be approximately 10m x 40m. Upon completion, the drill hole will be grouted to 1m below the surface and then backfilled with soil. The rehabilitation of all drill sites will be monitored in accordance with the Victorian Code of Practice for Mineral Exploration.

When will the program take place?

The Air Core program will commence in early April 2024 and will take approximately 2 months to complete.






NATIONAL RIDE TO SCHOOL DAY





A better deal for Murray Plains ENATIONALS For Regional Victoria

VICTORIAN BUDGET CRISIS: WALSH SAYS LIVES ARE ON THE LINE

The Nationals leader and Member for Murray Plains, Peter Walsh, says the Allan Labor government's crippling record debt is now putting lives on the line.

And Mr Walsh says if Premier Jacinta Allan's latest plan to rip countless millions of dollars out of the regional hospital system goes ahead people will end up paying a very high price.

He says when Labor won power in 2014 it inherited a strong balance sheet, with a "easily managed" debt of \$22.3 billion.

"Victoria is now facing a staggering debt of \$178 billion by 2027 and that will only keep climbing because Ms Allan and her incompetent Cabinet have not got a clue about managing money let alone a whole economy," Mr Walsh says.

"Regional and rural health services across Victoria are facing forced amalgamations, service cuts and closures as the Allan Labor government slashes millions in health funding in a desperate bid to shore up our collapsing economy," he says.

"Weeks ahead of the upcoming State Budget, reports have indicated Labor is forcing unrealistic savings targets on all of Victoria's 76 health services, which will collectively see millions cut over coming years.

"These funding cuts follow confirmation more than a dozen regional health services suffered operating losses across 2022-23, with projections that by June this year, more than half Victoria's health services face negative daily cash balances."

Mr Walsh says leaked internal briefings reveal bosses at multiple country health services have warned the forced "unrealistic" savings targets are unsustainable. He says some reported multimillion-dollar deficits last financial year and now say there is no way to cut costs without impacting frontline services.

The directive to slash costs came from the Victorian Department of Treasury and Finance to all 76 health services and had individual targets across the next three financial years, under what are called Financial Management Improvement Plans.

"Victoria's massive debt equals \$70,000 for every Victorian household," Mr Walsh added. "Our grandchildren, and generations beyond, will be paying for this catastrophic financial failure by the Premier and Labor's fantasyland where the more it spends the less people will want to check the bottom line.


"Victorians should make no mistake, these are not changes to improve efficiency, but desperate and savage cuts triggered by Labor's financial mismanagement," he says.

"Under the Allan Labor Government, regional and rural communities across the state will be stripped of their voice in local health services as this latest round of funding cuts by stealth is the real-world consequence of Labor's financial mismanagement and it is patients across rural and regional Victoria who will suffer.

"Under Labor, Victorians are already struggling to access basic healthcare and are waiting longer for vital treatments, just look at this week's reports of seriously ill people waiting hours in ambulances outside hospital because there is no bed available for them.

"These cuts and threats of large-scale amalgamations demonstrate the disdain Labor has for rural and regional communities."






