LOCKINGTON - LINES IN TIME

Hello again everyone,

We have reached August 1909, as we look back at the early newspapers to learn how the farming communities of this district were faring.

It had been an unusual year with regular rainfall throughout -Too much in mid-winter, leaving the paddocks so wet that cropping activities were set back, and causing flooding at Rochester.

However, there was good news for Warragamba residents when, on 28 August, the Elmore Standard, published details of tenders accepted for works at the local school; one, for the removal of the school building at Diggora South, to be reerected at the site of the Warragamba State School; the other was for the construction of a new school residence at Warragamba. Whatever the weather, by New Year, the students and teachers at Warragamba could hope to enjoy better conditions.

Our local district lost several highly respected residents in late winter and early spring of 1909. On 27 August, Mr David McGregor, of Diggora, the eldest son of Mr William McGregor, senr., of Diggora, died at Rochester. Mr David McGregor was unmarried and, at just 51 years of age, his unexpected death was due to a serious back problem, belatedly diagnosed.

On 1 September, Mr William Stuart Wragge, the eldest son of the late Mr W William Wragge, formerly of Restdown and Wharparilla Stations, died at Box Hill. He was only 27 years old and, in 1908, had married a local young lady, Miss Annie C Johnstone, of Echuca.

Then, the news of the death of Mr John Coghlin, formerly of Rochester, Elmore and Diggora, on 12 September 1909, must have been particularly sad, coming just days after the wedding of his son Mr John L Coghlin. Mr Coghlin Senr., died at Bendigo. He was 67 years of age and had lived in this district for 37 years, initially as a hotelkeeper in Rochester, then farming at Diggora, before becoming the licensee of the Commercial Hotel at Elmore for a number of years.

He retired to the family farm at Diggora in 1903, before going to live in Bendigo with his daughter late in 1908.

(On 16 October 1909, the Elmore Standard carried a report of the Coghlin-McGann wedding, celebrated at St Joseph's Catholic Church, Rochester on 8 September. The bride, Miss Annie McGann was the eldest daughter of Mr and Mrs John McGann of Warragamba and she married Mr John L Coghlin, son of Mr John Coahlin of Bendiao.)

Diggora lost another resident on Sunday, 10 October, when 73year-old Mr Francis Grant was fatally gored by a bull. He was attempting to move the animal from one paddock to another when it suddenly turned on him. Mr Grant sustained serious injuries and died within minutes.

On the wider scene, it was proposed that the Shire of Echuca be renamed the Shire of Rochester. On 13 October 1909, a deputation discussed the matter with Mr Cameron, the Acting Minister for Public Works, and Mr Drake, the Secretary of Public Works. Among those attending were Cr Doherty, (the Shire President), Crs Graham, Martin and McMaster, and Messrs Hart and Cheetham, (the president and secretary of the Traders' Association) – All of whom supported the alteration of name – and Crs Crawford and Braund, who opposed it. After quite lengthy discourse, as reported by the Bendigo Advertiser on 14 October, "Mr. Cameron said he had come to the conclusion that the name ought to be changed to Rochester. The opponents of the proposal had not produced one reason why the change should not be made. Inconvenience and confusion had been proven, and he would have to accede to the wishes of the majority. For all these reasons, he felt compelled to alter the name. It would be in the interests of Echuca and everyone else."

Another news item of enormous consequence in our local region was reported by the Bendigo Advertiser that day. The State Cabinet had agreed to purchase 5000 acres of land at Bamawm, consisting of various allotments belonging to different owners. It was to be bought at a price within that recommended by the Closer Settlement Board. The vendors were Messrs Wm Burge, Jas Benton, A Edney, A Cunnington, Wm Boyd, R McDowall, R Allan, Wm Butt and Alf Greig. Mr Elwood Mead, an American with experience in irrigation and closer settlement, engaged as the Water Commission's chairman, was "desirous" that something be done on a large scale to demonstrate to our agriculturists the practical value of irrigation. Special settlers would have to be imported from Great Britain, America and Europe for the irrigation blocks, and the Closer Settlement Board members doubted that such settlers could be attracted to "£10 an acre land", in view of the comparative cheapness of land in their own countries

The land purchased at Bamawm was within the irrigation district, and would be taken in hand by the Water Commission and the Closer Settlement Board. Water would be supplied by extensions from the Waranga channel, in the Goulburn water system. The Closer Settlement Board and the Water Supply Commission had been negotiating for the purchase of the Bamawm properties for several weeks.

As reported in the Elmore Standard on 23 October 1909, Warragamba residents were thrilled that work on the local school site was to go ahead. On 20 October, a meeting of parents and friends took place at the school, to decide on some suitable event for the opening of the new building, eventually settling for a concert and supper to be held on 22 December. The supper arrangements would be made by the ladies, whilst concert items were left in the hands of the head teacher. Other local news from the Diggora area, concerned former local resident, Miss Delia Quinn, who was professed in religion as Sister Mary Josephine, at the Brigidine Convent, Albert Park on 1 November 1909.

LOCKINGTON RURAL FIRE BRIGADE NEWS

As we head into another fire season our local brigades have been very busy in training, educating and preparing for the season ahead.

On Sunday, 20 October all our group brigades completed group training exercises.

On Saturday, 9 November, fire brigades from Lockington, Bamawm Extension, Kotta, Torrumbarry and Pine Grove completed a planned burn in the Forrest St Reserve area, as part of our ongoing work to protect our community from potential fire risk.

This burn follows on from works completed in 2022 and 2023 in this area. As well as helping protect our community, the burn off also provided invaluable early season training for our brigades.

Thank you to the District 20 CFA support personnel and the brigade members who assisted with this project.

On Sunday, 17 November the Lockington Rural Fire Brigade conducted an Open Day at the station. Members of the community had an opportunity to tour our facilities and check out our firefighting vehicles and equipment, while partaking in a free sausage sizzle breakfast.

Among the many highlights was Peter Staindl's extensive display of model fire fighting vehicles. Another popular highlight, especially for the children, was the opportunity to squirt water.

Thanks to the brigade members for organising and conducting this informative and fun community event.

Australian netball legend Sharelle McMahon is making a return to the Melbourne Vixens and Netball Victoria in a key off-court role.

In a coup for Victorian netball, the former Australian captain and champion goaler will be back in the fold to head up Netball Victoria's high performance and pathway programs.

McMahon has spent the past three years working at Cricket Victoria as its head of female cricket, but felt the time was right to make a return to netball.

One of the greatest nethallers of all time, McMahon played 118 Tests for the Diamonds – the second most capped Australian player behind Liz Ellis – was the first Victorian nethaller to be immortalised in bronze in a statue outside John Cain Arena and has the Vixens' annual best and fairest award named in her honour.

After spreading her wings in a different sport, McMahon said she was excited to return to netball to take on a new challenge.

"The opportunities that I have been given through playing netball have been unbelievable in many ways in my life, so it means a huge amount to be able to take this next step in my career," McMahon said.

"I have been in the role at Cricket Victoria for three years and I have really enjoyed my time in cricket and feel like I have learnt and developed an enormous amount.

"Probably in the back of my mind, I thought eventually I would come back into netball, but it wasn't at the forefront of my mind when I took on the role in cricket.

"But I think it is the right time for me to be exploring a new opportunity." McMahon steps into the new role of general manager of high performance and pathways following Megan Simpson's move to Netball Australia

An inaugural captain of the Melbourne Vixens, McMahon played more than 200 games for the Melbourne Phoenix and Vixens and won six national league premierships.

McMahon will work closely with the Vixens' Super Netball team, Netball Victoria's high performance and pathway programs in her new role.

The shooting great said ensuring the state's best netball talent had an avenue to the top and helping netball remain a leader in women's sport were her priorities.

"It's been an interesting time in women's sport and for nethall in a few different ways over the last few years and while nethall has been a really great leader in women's sport, I think there is a great opportunity to continue to build and grow and hold that space," McMahon said.

"It has changed so much since I first started playing netball and women's sport has changed incredibly in that time and, again, I think it is this exciting time of opportunity for netball.

"So to be part of taking that forward, to ensure that Victorians have lots of great opportunities to participate in sport and for those talented ones, which is the focus of my role at Netball Victoria, to take those talented ones through as far as far as they possibly can."

McMahon had worked as a specialist coach with the Vixens, VIS and also the Diamonds before taking up the role at Cricket Victoria.

She has not closed the door on coaching in the future, but right now is more focused on sporting administration.

"Prior to taking the cricket

role, I was heading down that coaching path, both with the Vixens and the Australian Diamonds in an assistant coaching role and I do love that, I really do love that space," Mc-Mahon said.

"But when I did a bit of planning around what I wanted the future to look like, it was this type of role that really excited me. So that is the path that I am taking at the moment.

"I don't like to close too many doors or put too many restrictions on what's next because I never know what opportunities come up, so I would never say never to anything.

"But my focus right now is this role and that overarching piece around making sure we are putting the best and right structures in for those talented players that are coming through."

McMahon said she had benefited from stepping into a different sporting environment to broaden her perspective.

"I thought that being exposed to a different environment would be really beneficial for me and cricket for a very long time has been one of the leaders in the female sports space," McMahon said.

"For me, being able to be involved in that area and step out of my comfort zone a little bit has been an opportunity I have really appreciated, I'm very grateful for that.

"It would have been challenging in many ways to step straight into a role like this, so to be able to be exposed to a different environment, get that experience and learning has opened the possibility of this being a good opportunity for me to take."

PETER WALSH STEPS ASIDE AS NATIONALS LEADER

After a decade in the role, Peter Walsh has stood down as leader of The Nationals in Victoria and deputy leader of the Coalition but will continue as the Member for Murray Plains.

Mr Walsh has dedicated the past 22 years to serving regional and rural Victoria since 2002 – first winning the seat of Swan Hill and then the new seat of Murray Plains following a redistribution in 2014.

Before entering Parliament, he owned and operated one of the state's largest tomato growing operations as part of his irrigated horticulture and cropping enterprise, also producing cereals, oilseeds and legumes.

In that role he began his public and community service as Victorian Farmers Federation president; a director of the National Farmers Federation and a director of SPC Limited.

Born and raised in Boort, Mr Walsh's time farming and living in regional Victoria saw him naturally interested in agricultural and water policy, which is why, he said, he put his hand up to try and make a difference.

After his work with the VFF and entering politics, Mr Walsh would go on to serve as Minister for Agriculture and the Minister for Water in the 2010-2014 Coalition Government. He was elected leader of the Victorian Nationals following the November 2014 election.

In 2003 he was awarded a Centenary Medal for his services to the environment.

Mr Walsh said the development of the Murray Darling Basin Plan was one of his biggest political challenges, fighting hard in Opposition and Government to ensure the rights of Victorian irrigators were fairly balanced with the needs of the environment.

"It has been my privilege to serve the people of two electorates in regional Victoria, in particular, and the whole state in general, and to have been able to lead The Nationals for 10 years and help return to party to the prominence it and its supporters deserve, with 11 members in the Parliament, has been something which I look on with pride and satisfaction," Mr Walsh explained.

"I would also like to personally thank all the staff who have worked with me, put up with me, through all these years, it would not have been possible to do the work I have without their support," he added.

"And I cannot thank the people of the seats of Swan Hill, and Murray Plains enough for their ongoing support, and trust in me, as their voice in the state's Parliament. And I look forward to continuing to work on their behalf as we head towards the 2026 election and returning the right parties to government."

Outside politics, Mr Walsh is a keen footy fan. He not only played football for Boort but was also the club president, committee member and selector at various stages.

Fed Up - Regional Roads

Residents across our region are fed up with the state of the roads.

Everywhere drivers are dodging potholes, slowing down at rough surface warning signs and driving slowly through road works only to see the works washed out or broken just months later. I've heard from many locals who have spent thousands of dollars on car repairs from driving on rough surfaces.



It's not good enough and regional drivers deserve better, safer roads. I continue to demand the Federal Labor Government invest more money into the roads but also for the state Labor government to use road funding effectively and make lasting repairs.

Childcare Challenges
