
"In the afternoon they all went on a tour of the Lockington Bush Nursing facility which was eye opening!

LOCKINGTON - LINES IN TIME

Hello again everyone,

We have reached November 1909, as we look back at the early newspapers to learn how the farming communities of this district were faring.

Regular rainfall throughout the year caused harvest prospects to appear bright, and returns seemed likely to be above average. However, high temperatures reported by the Elmore Standard on 13 November, played havoc with the crops and the late ones withered. Even the more forward crops had their yields diminished by the sudden advent of hot summer weather. The maximum shade temperature of that week was 97° degrees fahrenheit [36° celsius].

The Elmore Standard, that same day, carried the sad report of the death of Mr James McKay of Warragamba. He died at Rochester on 21 October, after having undergone an operation for appendicitis. The late Mr McKay, who was 40 years of age, left a widow and five children, the eldest just eight years old, and the youngest aged 10 weeks, to mourn the loss of a devoted husband and father. Great sympathy was felt in their bereavement.

The deceased was born in Drummartin, and his father, the late Mr Nathaniel McKay, was one of the earliest pioneers in that district. Mr James McKay's death, marked the first break in a family of twelve. One of his brothers was Mr Hugh V McKay, of Sunshine Harvester fame, while another was a machinery expert in the Argentine Republic, and several other brothers held prominent public positions in various parts of the State. He was the sixth son of Mrs M McKay, and was a highly esteemed resident of the Warragamba district. His untimely and sudden death caused deep regret.

On the wider scene, Irrigation, and the Closer Settlement Scheme which accompanied it, were major topics. Our district was right in the midst of it, and changes loomed. As reported in the Melbourne Age on 11 December 1909, on 10 December, Mr Elwood Mead, chairman of the Water Commission, accompanied by Mr Dethridge, Deputy Engineer-in-Chief, and

Mr. Sampson, valuer, of the Lands department, visited Bamawm, where 5000 acres of farm land had been acquired as the nucleus of an irrigation colony, eventually expected to encompass 40,000 acres. Suitable additional land would be chosen and purchased, if owners were willing to sell at a fair price.

As it was asserted that irrigation was meant for intense culture, the proposal was for holdings of from 20 to 200 acres. Mr Mead intended to establish small allotments of one and two acres along the channels, as homes for the families of farm workers, and he expected to have one family to an average of 50 acres. On the Bamawm settlement, there would be 800 families, representing about 4000 people. As local demand for irrigation blocks was practically exhausted, Mr Mead considered it would be necessary to bring settlers from abroad, who could show Australians how the land could be profitably used under irrigation conditions.

For the present, however, the local scene was little changed. On 4 December 1909, the Weekly Times relayed favourable reports of the wheat crops, received from Diggora, Warragamba, Bamawm, Pannoomilloo and Tennyson. However, by mid-December, the weather became excessively hot, temperature registering about 100° fahrenheit [37.7° celsius] and as high as 107° fahrenheit [41.5° celsius]. Though reports of excellent yields continued to emerge, the hot winds reduced the returns from those crops not

A massive bush fire started at Wharparilla on 20 December 1909, ostensibly caused by a threshing machine, but undoubtedly exacerbated by the heatwave conditions. It destroyed about 5000 acres of grassland, more than 1000 bags of wheat, haystacks, sheds and out buildings, and two farm homesteads were completely burnt out.

But, there was good news, too. Warragamba residents were happy with their recently-arrived, attractively renovated classroom, and they were pleased with the new-built teacher's residence - an "imposing structure... a modification of a Queen Anne pattern, consisting of five large rooms, together with a pantry and bathroom... a detached shed and wash-house erected at the rear, thus completing a very nice home." As reported in the Elmore Standard on 8 January 1910, a function was held at the school on the evening of 22nd December 1909, to celebrate.

Completion of the harvest was delayed slightly, due to weather conditions and labour shortages, but the feelings expressed by the Diggora West correspondent when writing to the Bendigo Independent on 21 January 1910, were typical of the local farmers. Though oats in particular had been wind-damaged, the harvest had been one of the best. A "good" price meant farmers would "be well paid for their last twelve months' labour."

A Mr Paynter, a visitor to Wharparilla, wrote to the West Gippsland Gazette on 8 February, that the harvest in the northern district was "really wonderful." He had "never before seen such a bountiful supply of wheat" ... "It seemed to be everywhere and every railway station was overloaded. There was also splendid grass" and "feed seemed to be abundant."

On 12 January 1910, notices in the Argus and the Age, stated that, of 70,000 acres of land in the Bamawm district, 30,000 to 40,000 acres would be proclaimed an irrigation area. This land, commanded by the main channel, would be subject to the compulsory irrigation charge of about 5/ per acre per annum. The Closer Settlement Board would take steps to purchase the land and arrange prices. No compulsory purchases would be made, and any current owners who preferred to sub-divide, or to pay the irrigation charge of 5/ per acre per annum, would be able to do so. By 15 January, applications for irrigation blocks had already been received.
