LOCKINGTON - LINES IN TIME

Hello again everyone,

We have reached Spring of 1906, an unusually wet year, as we look back at the early newspapers to learn how the people of this district were faring.

Through winter, the weather remained cold and showery, permitting little growth, and by August, some farmers saw reason to complain. In September and October, low-lying ground, particularly around the Milloo district, was still covered feet deep with water, and damage to crops was expected. By 17 September, the Bendigo Independent could report from Tennyson, that all field work was at a standstill, and shearing operations were greatly detained, by the wet conditions. The Diggora West correspondent also wrote to the Independent, saying that crops and grass there were covered by water, and little fallowing had been possible.

Fortunately, the ongoing rains had not deterred the residents from their recreation. Milloo's annual school concert at the end of August was well attended, as was the Warragamba Methodist Sunday School's anniversary celebration. A thunderstorm and heavy rain across the district in early September saw a fall of more than 31/4 inches [about 80 mms] in less than 48 hours at Tennyson. Nevertheless, the entertainments continued; the Elmore Standard on 22 September 1906, reported on a very enjoyable dance held at the Tennyson Hall on 12 September, and an equally enjoyable dance held in Kildea's barn at Diggora, on 17 September.

On 6 October, the Leader reported that damage done by the flood waters was relatively slight, and crops were "looking splendid," but one Milloo family had been quite seriously affected by the wet conditions. As reported in Bendigo Advertiser on 2 October, flood waters had surrounded the home of Mrs J Mitchell, a widow with a young family, and actually caused the house to collapse. Hot and sultry weather set in across the region by mid-November, and on 19 November, the Bendigo Advertiser reported a severe storm had occurred late the previous afternoon, bringing "hurricane force" winds, heavy rain and hail to the Rochester district.

Buildings were damaged in the township, and "huge trees were smashed to pieces in all directions." While there was "not a single crop left standing round the town," damage in the outer district was less extensive. In late November, a reporter from the Leader visited the Campaspe region and found "good crops" about Milloo and towards the Terricks. His report on 1 December 1906, noted that the rain, and ensuing cool weather, had been of immense good to the wheat crops, ensuring they would head out well, but dairy farmers in the area were experiencing adverse conditions due to grass drying off. He also noted an increase in sparrows and starlings, and the need for district farmers to deal with stinkwort and thistles, especially the saffron thistle.

On 12 December, a fire broke out in Mr Alf Raper's paddock at Diggora West, consuming about twenty acres of grass, but all went well otherwise, and there were high hopes that this would be one of the district's better seasons.

Meanwhile, the long campaign for rail facilities, on the plains between the Echuca and Swan Hill railway lines, had re-surfaced. There was now a proposal that a line be constructed between Cohuna and Rochester, and on 26 October 1906, as reported by the Bendigo Independent on 30 October, a largely-attended meeting was held at the Tennyson Hall to discuss what area might benefit by such a line, and "to obtain signatures of the landowners willing to guarantee 4 per cent per annum on the cost of Those present preferred that a line be constructed from Cohuna to Elmore, "on the present survey," and a motion to that effect was carried.

It was decided that Crs Martin and McIntyre, of the Echuca Shire be appointed as delegates "to attend and report at a meeting to be held at Tolhurst, Torrumbarry North." On 23 November 1906, the Kerang New Times reported that progress had been made regarding the Premier Mr Bent's requirements in reference to the proposed rail service to Cohuna. Further meetings were held across the region, and the benefits of the various routes were widely debated, though the Elmore route was generally supported. Guarantees from landholders had been procured, and it was expected that relevant documentation could be placed before Parliament before its current sitting ended.

On 5 December 1906, a deputation representing the Cohuna Railway League and district municipal officials met with the Premier and Minister for Railways (Mr Bent), to urge the construction of the railway line to serve Cohuna. Unfortunately, as reported by the Melbourne Herald on 5 December, the delegates lacked unanimity, and Mr Bent gave no commitment beyond a "promise to think over the representations just made to him." This situation remained until 20 December, when in the Legislative Assembly, Mr Bent moved that the matter of connecting Cohuna to the existing railway system be referred to the Parliamentary Standing Committee on Railways for inquiry and report. The Elmore Standard reported on 22 December 1906, that the resolution met agreement.

Among several pioneer settlers of this district who died in 1906 was Mr James Small, a long-time resident of Diggora. In addition to his farming role, Mr Small had been a contractor of note. In the 1880s, he was involved in the construction of the initial bank across the Waranga Basin, part of a subsequently abandoned Government Irrigation Scheme. He also constructed several miles of the Goulburn Main Channel, near Murchison, and a few years later, secured the contract for the erection of the Campaspe Weir, situated midway between Elmore and Rochester. He died aged 82 years, on 11 August. Others who would be missed were Mr John James of Wanurp, who died on 15 October, and Cr Henry M Ham, of Pannoomilloo, who died in Rochester on 29 November. Both had resided in the district for more than thirty years.

There will be more of 1906 next time. 'Bye.



OBITUARY - ALISON MITCHELL

Following are excerpts of Alison Mitchell's life as recollected by Trevor, Janet, Bev and Darren.

Alison Jean Bacon was born on 10 August 1940 in Elmore, to George and Sarah Bacon. She was the 4th of 6 children, Norm, Ken, Joyce, Alison, Henry and Les. She started her life in Drummartin, not long after they moved to Diggora West.

In October 1949 her parents purchased a soldiers settlement block which became the family farm at Tennyson. Seven months after the death of her father, tragedy struck the family again when Mum came down with Polio at the age of 10. She was sent to Melbourne and was hospitalised in The Hampton Convalescent Home. It was an extremely isolating time for Mum as visits were limited to once a month.

In spite of the challenges that polio brought her, Mum's determination allowed her to live a normal life. She would not only participate in local tennis and netball, but she would excel, which is a credit to her fighting spirit. Mum would fondly recite stories of her favorite past time, walking through paddocks and looking for bird life with her neighbor Eileen McIntyre, both being members of the Bev and Janet have a key memory of Mum saying 'when Junior Gould League Bird Lovers Club.

As a teenager she developed a friendship with Dorothy Mitchell, who later became her sister-in-law. Mum and Dad married in the Forest St Methodist Church Bendigo on 16 the Mitchell family farm in Broad Acres.

First building chook sheds and selling the eggs in Bendigo. Mum would spend hours cleaning the eggs ready to be sold. They continued to build the farm including increasing the number of sheep and upgrading to a Herringbone dairy. They bought a few more sows, as many dairy farmers did back then, to use up the skim and excess milk. As time went on and the farm expanded the sow herd unconditional love of all her children to fulfil her wishes. had grown to just over 500 sows.

Mum and Dad valued family and time spent together. They welcomed their first child together, Trevor, shortly followed by Janet, Bev and Darren. They made room the family for a young, 2-year-old boy, David. They would stop off at St Luke Toddlers home and pick David up for weekends and family of seven.

An important part of our family life was attending Tennyson Methodist/Uniting Church, where the family gained life long friends. The school holidays were very special, and we always looked forward to them. They were the only time we went to Bendigo. Holidays were spent with close family friends in Portarlington and Barwon Heads. We also of Mums everyday world, in particular times of need treasured the family holidays to St Leonard's.

From 1988 Mum and Dad began their annual trips around Australia with close friends. We used to love hearing Mum and Dad's caravan adventures and tales of pulling up to the legacy of Mum's worth when all the staff came to give camp for the evening and in Mums words 'circling the their goodbyes, which did not just include a chat but wagons at night', to enjoy an open fire and lots of laughter and music together.

Mum and Dad played a big role in the Lockington Lions Club. Mum being one of the first lady members to join the club which paved the way to have more ladies join. She took on many roles in supporting Dad, but also having her own projects. These included Children's Christmas letters, Christmas cakes, Care Bears and assisting with the organisation of the Youth of the Year. After tragedy struck the family, with the loss of their beloved granddaughter in the lifetime of love that you 1983, Mum felt the need to give back and become an gave us. advocate, selling red noses and badges to fundraise for SIDS research for a number of years.



are you going to start having kids?'. Soon enough she well and truly ate her words, having 13 grandchildren in 13 years. When it came to Sunday roasts, Mama wouldn't be found sitting still. She would be either at the kitchen sink January 1960. They then promptly took over the running of doing dishes, folding tea towels or sitting on the opposite side of the bench while meat is being carved asking anyone who has snuck a piece of meat 'can you whistle'. She showed us the true joy of being a Grandma.

> After Dads passing it was Mums wish to stay on the farm. During this time, she showed us an inner strength and pure determination to remain independent and stay in her family home. It was through the generosity, kindness and She was able to stay in the house that was full of love and a lifetime of memories she shared with Dad.

We as a family will be forever grateful for the compassion and support provided to allow Mum to fulfil her wishes and to find closure after Dads passing. As Mums condition was deteriorating and required increasing levels of care, holidays, giving him the experience of family life. This is we decided it was time for Mum to trial periods of respite how David became part of our family. To us, we were a at Wharparilla Lodge while Trevor was away on extended holiday. After her short stays, she made the decision to move into Wharparilla Lodge full time, in Mums words 'it was time to retire to Echuca'.

> As a family we could not be more grateful for the support, care and love that the Wharparilla community provided to Mum. They embraced, nurtured and became a huge part during the pandemic with restricted visiting times. We knew Mum was at home when she would greet everyone with a cheeky grin and give them big bear hugs. The staff grew to be a part of Mums extended family. We truly felt multiple kisses and cuddles right up until the end. We will be forever in debt for the compassion and care provided to our Mum.

SHINING A SPOTLIGHT ON FARM SAFETY

Farmsafe Australia has published its annual Safer Farms Report for 2024.

Supported by WFI Insurance, the release coincided with National Farm Safety Week (15-21 July) and aims to enhance safety practices on farms across the country. Executive General Manager Andrew Beer said WFI sees first-hand the adverse outcomes of when things go wrong on farms, where events can unfold quickly and often in remote locations.

"Many of the accidents we see are preventable, which can make it even more heartbreaking," he said. "While our data shows a reduction in incidents across some agricultural sectors over the past year, we have also seen horrific life-changing injuries, leaving devastation that extends far beyond the farm gate."

Trends have included a decrease in liability claims across most segments, with falls from heights down by 75% and impact injuries reduced by 30%; and a 7% reduction in farm collisions, contributing to a 23% overall decline over four years. Data from the past five years showed that knee injuries were the most common, followed by lower back and shoulder injuries. Lacerations made up 32% of claims, fractures 19%, and soft tissue injuries 17%.

The main risks remain heavy machinery, large animals, and severe weather, with farm property damage claims from natural events rising by 32% in the past year. Machinery incidents were often linked to fatigue, loss of concentration, and skipping safety steps to expedite tasks. Self-managed repairs, frequently without proper disengagement, were a leading cause of injuries.

"Behind these statistics are people, whose lives, properties, and livelihoods have forever been changed. Safety must always be the central consideration when working on farms," Beer said.







AFL GRANTS AN INDICTMENT ON ALLAN LABOR GOVERNMENT

The Nationals leader and Member for Murray Plains, Peter Walsh, says local football and netball clubs across regional Victoria can now apply for a share of \$600,000 to improve their club as part of an annual road safety rewards grants program.

Mr Walsh says the Transport Accident Commission (TAC) has kicked off this year's TAC Club Rewards program, which encourages local clubs to promote road safety to members during the season. An important message he agrees must be delivered to young people as half Victoria's 128 road deaths this year have been in regional areas – which only represent about 25 per cent of the state's population.

The TAC program allows AFL Victoria-affiliated football and netball clubs to apply for as much as \$10,000 to spend on club initiatives including club transport, new equipment and uniforms or facility upgrades.

"Unfortunately, the irony of this TAC program will probably be lost on Premier Jacinta Allan and her government as it is their funding cuts and total lack of interest in regional Victoria which is behind the appalling deterioration of our road network," Mr Walsh explains.

"The latest data available show things have gotten so bad under the Allan Labor government that 91 percent of roads across the state are now classified as being in 'poor' or 'very poor' condition," he says. "As part of this year's TAC program, clubs will be asked to start conversations and be part of the campaign to raise awareness of the dangers of speeding, with the tagline – 'Show up for your team. Slow down on the road'.

"It is a valuable message which must be heard, road safety is paramount for all our sporting teams, not just footballers and netballers, who travel vast distances on our crumbling roads each week to attend training and games. And The Nationals will continue to campaign to have that funding restored to improve the quality, and safety, of our road surfaces – a Liberals Nationals government will make it a priority."
