From the smallest of acorns, the grandest of oak trees grow. Today Locky News celebrates a remarkable milestone with the publication of the 1000th edition of the Lockington community's very own newspaper.

The inaugural edition - known as Community News - was published on 5 August, 1983 and comprised four pages.

A total of 400 copies were produced at a printing cost of \$78.00, auspiced by a passionate group of locals known as the Lockington Co-ordinating Committee, comprising Lexie Koch, Marie Gordon, Fae Stevens, Glenda Nichol, Ken Dunstan and Chris Stewart.

Issue two on 19 August, 1983 jumped to eight pages and was printed and collated at Lockington School. Locky News was subsequently produced fortnightly until 27 March 1986, then monthly until 4 July 1986.

Beryl Marshall and Chris Stewart typed the newspaper on manual typewriters in their own home for 10 years from 1986 until computers became accessible, once again at the School.

A major milestone came in July 1997 when Locky News moved into an office within the Lockington Living Heritage Complex, then again only a matter of weeks ago when responsibility for collating and printing the paper was formally transferred to Lockington Neighbourhood House, under the umbrella of Lockington and District Business Centre.

We would like to take this opportunity to congratulate and sincerely thank each and every person who has played a role in the life of Locky News over its 41-year history.

From those who have served as Editor to the Committee Members who have supported the paper's operation in the background, the Volunteers who have assisted with distribution to the Contributors who have provided news items and the Advertisers who have ensured its ongoing financial viability.

You all deserve the community's heartfelt acknowledgement and are a part of the enduring Locky News success story.

### **LOCKINGTON - LINES IN TIME**

Hello again Everyone,

We have reached October 1908, as we look back at the early newspapers to read the local news, but this time we're looking for more recent news.

We're checking our very own priceless paper from its first issue on 5 August 1983, through some of the hundreds of issues we've enjoyed since then. The following items are just a few of the many.

1983 Sept - Lockington Lions celebrated 10 years of "Lionism", Bamawm CWA celebrated its 21st Birthday.

1987 Dec - Lockington featured on BCV8 TV News, when palms from the Masonic Hall grounds were sold to the Port Melbourne Authority and removed. They had to go as they were causing structural damage to the hall.

1988 July - Six debutants and their partners were presented to Eddie Hann MLA and his wife Jenny at the Football Club Ball held in the Lockington Community Centre. Trainers were Wally and Greta Rankin.

1989 June - Lockington-born footballer Noel (Nobby) O'Brien died. Nobby kicked 45 goals in his first season playing with VFL team Carlton in the 1950s. In November - Jackie Walker, local entrant in the Miss Australia Quest, won the Miss Golden North Fundraiser Title.

1990 March - A Heritage Group was formed at Tennyson. In December - Cyril Robins retired as the school gardener.

1991 January – Jim Henderson, World War II serviceman, highly respected bus driver, businessman and respected community member. The highly dangerous work undertaken from May 1945 to May 1946 by Jim, as one of just 200 RAAF personnel, was belatedly being acknowledged.

1992 January - Local couples, Arthur and Mary Weller and Pat and Annie Vick celebrated their Diamond (60th) Wedding Anniversaries.

In July - Nicole Cunnington, representing the Lockington Judo Club, won a gold medal at the Australian Judo Championships.

1993 January - Lockington Community Care Committee sought people interested in renting units at Water Wheel Court. Work had begun on construction of four units on land given by the Rochester Shire Council.

In February - Travis Fimmel received a Social Service Award and a Distinction and Excellence Award in respect to his attendance at Echuca High School in 1992.

In July - Sharelle McMahon was selected to play in the Australian Under 17 Netball Team.

In August - notice of the intention to close the local branch of the Westpac Bank, brought strong reaction from the people of Lockington and District, which attracted considerable support. Channel 10 came to the town, and interviews and film were featured on Southern Cross Television News. The helicopter landing on the oval provided a thrill for the children at the Lockington School. On 20 August - the Official Opening of Water Wheel Court marked a successful conclusion to eight years of

1994 February - An Inspiration of the Rochester Shire's Recreational Officer led to the first Free Australia Day Breakfast, organized by the Lockington Action Group: - Bacon & Eggs, BYO chairs, and a Flag Raising Ceremony to follow. In March - Kathryn Field, who was Victoria's Top Student in 1993, scoring 167.8 of a possible 168 points, was acknowledged at the Premier's VCE Awards.

In April - Bill Williams received Lions' Highest Award; the Melvin Jones Fellowship, awarded for attributes of generosity, compassion and care for others. In May – the Shire Heritage Advisor met with Councillors and representatives of the Lockington Community Care Board of Management. He considered that the O'Brien's Store group of buildings was significant in the history and development of Lockington and District, and encouraged preservation. In August – a public meeting approved a proposal to acquire the group of buildings in Market Street to create a central place to store and display items of historical interest to the district.

1995 January - After 70 years of trading the O'Brien Store in Market Street was the site of an historic auction to dispose of all remaining stock. After the Sale, the Lockington and District Living Heritage Complex committee would co-ordinate restoration plans. In September - the Wall of Remembrance was unveiled at a site close by the Lockington Community Centre.

1996 October - An enthusiastic committee was working on the forward planning for a Back-to-Lockington to take place on Anzac Day weekend in April 1997. Readers were urged to begin work on a sequel to "Then... The Water Wheel Turned," entries for a song and poem competition, or an entry for the Street Parade.

These items are taken from a quick skim through the first three hundred or so issues of our priceless paper. There was just so much more! Community events, balls, sports meetings, church gatherings, new arrivals, farewells, special birthdays, weddings, obituaries. anniversaries, new babies, awards and acknowledgements, travellers' tales protests, celebrations, and the list goes on.

Luckily, copies are kept at the State Library, and local history buffs in the future will be able to access them for research purposes.

Thank you to everyone who has ever helped in any way with the production of this wonderful newspaper and its contribution to the story of our town and district.

### BACK IN THE BEGINNING

heartfelt Ken Dunstone readily recalls the challenges associated with producing Locky News in its earliest days.

> Ken was one of a small group of locals who banded together to initiate what was first known as the Community News.

> "We just thought that Lockington people needed a reliable outlet for information sharing," he said, explaining that the concept had been borrowed from similar small rural townships.

> "Marie Gordon collected most of the articles and she was really the original editor although I also assisted.

> "Marie would type the information up on a typewriter, then cut up the articles and paste them onto paper for printing.

> "All the ads were cut and pasted individually for every edition and we'd photocopy the newsletter at the school," Ken said.

> Copiers of the era were unable to print double sided so the paper was manually fed. Each edition was also stapled together by hand.

"Marie and I would go to the school every Sunday night and when it was true celebration of your commitment to the hot we had to have a fan going to cool the copier; it was a small desktop unit designed to do 10 or 20 copies at a time and we were producing 400 newspapers.

> "The downside was that the fan would often blow the pages all over the room. Some editions were four double-sided pages; it was a lot of manual work.

> Ken said Community News - now Locky News - had been printed continuously since and become something the local community relied

> "It's still just as important as it was in those early days," he suggested. "It informs people about what's happening and keeps the responsibility local."
