LOCKINGTON - LINES IN TIME

Hello again everyone,

We have reached April 1910, as we look back at the early newspapers to learn how the farming communities of this district were faring.

It was expected that 1910 would bring enormous changes for our district, due to the development of the Bamawm Irrigation Scheme. However, for much of the district, at least for a while, life continued with little change.

Fine autumn weather, following on from an early break in March, enabled sowing to proceed satisfactorily through April, but farmers were looking anxiously for rain in the latter half of May. In the meantime, there were concerts, lawn tennis competitions, football matches, and hare shoots, as well as M I A meetings with associated activities. These, and school functions like the arbour day tree-planting at Warragamba on 15 June, served to distract the local residents a little from an increasing concern about the ongoing dry weather.

An outbreak of sore eyes occurred amongst local children, the symptoms being different from blight and resembling a form of fever in the eye.It was accompanied by headaches.Fortunately, that situation eased, and then beneficial rain fell at the end of June enabling sowing to be completed.

On 1 June 1910, the Tennyson Hall was beautifully decorated to provide the setting for the wedding of Mr Frederick Bray, youngest son of Mr and Mrs R Bray, of "Hampden," Bendigo, and Miss Grace Pitts, second eldest daughter of Mr and Mrs Thomas Pitts, of "Rosemoyne," Tennyson. After the ceremony, the party partook of a sumptuous wedding breakfast in the Hall. The guests numbered about 120. In the evening Mr and Mrs Pitts entertained the guests in the Hall, where a very enjoyable evening was spent in dancing, singing, and games. Refreshments were provided, and the singing of "Auld Lang Syne" brought the day's festivities to a close. As reported in the Elmore Standard on 11 June, the happy couple left by the afternoon train for the metropolis, where the honeymoon was spent.

On 13 June 1910, a report appeared in the Melbourne Argus, stating that a petition was being signed by landholders in the Gunbower district, asking the Ministry for Railways to construct a railway line through the centre of the area between the existing Bendigo-Echuca and Bendigo-Kerang railway lines. Then, on 21 June, the Kerang New Times reported that a "quite large" gathering had been held in Kerang on 16 June, in response to a notice placed by the New Times, calling for a public meeting of people interested in the construction of a rail service to Cohuna.

Mr Randall, the secretary of the combined district railway leagues, addressed the meeting, explaining that the time was opportune to agitate for the construction of such a railway line. In 1907, the Railways Standing Committee had taken evidence in regard to the various routes proposed for a line to connect Cohuna with the main Bendigo-Echuca line.

That investigation, and the Committee's subsequent evaluation of the evidence presented, had led to the recommendation that, as an annual loss was expected to result from the construction and working of a railway to Cohuna, the committee considered it "inexpedient" right then to connect that town to the existing railway system. Since then, part of the Cohuna irrigation area had been cut up into closer settlement blocks and more subdivision was going on every day.

Also, the Bamawm irrigation settlement had "sprung up" close to one of the proposed routes. If the Minister for railways sanctioned the construction of a line immediately, it would still take two or three years to construct it, by which time the district would be yet more closely settled. Mr Randall felt that in view of these developments, the matter of a railway line to Cohuna could once again be brought before the Minister for Railways, asking that he recommend construction. It was considered that the various railway leagues which had existed at the time of the Standing Committee's 1907 visit, should be re-formed.

On 23 July 1910, the Elmore Standard reported on a meeting held at Elmore to urge that town's claims for the junction of the proposed Cohuna railway link. After discussion, it was resolved that a letter be forwarded to branches of the Railway League at Pannoobamawm, Tennyson, Wee Wee Rup, Gunbower, and Cohuna, offering to use every influence in support of a line, and inviting their co-operation in making Elmore the terminus. A week earlier, Cr D McIntyre, of Tennyson, waited on Mr T Cox, the secretary of the Elmore-Railway League, in reference to the proposed line from Cohuna, with Elmore as terminating point. Cr McIntyre's district favoured Elmore being the junction. The Cohuna Railway League held a public meeting, which was largely attended, in the Cohuna Hall on 14 July. It was resolved that a petition be sent to the Minister of Railways, through Mr John Cullen, M.L.A., requesting that the proposed Cohuna railway be brought before the Railway Standing Committee without delay. It was also agreed that the Cohuna League supported Elmore as the starting point.

On 27 July, the following report appeared in the Melbourne Age: -"In the Legislative Assembly yesterday, Mr Cullen asked the Minister of Railways if he would refer to the Railways Standing Committee the question of connecting Bamawm and Cohuna by a 5 feet 3 ins railway with the existing railway system between Elmore and Echuca. In reply, the Minister said that this railway, in conjunction with a number of others, would be considered by the Cabinet. He could not say yet whether this line would be referred to the Railways Standing Committee."

There will be more about the railway project next time.



Heat illness can be fatal if left untreated.


Recognise the early warning signs of heat related illness.

Heat may also worsen the condition of someone who already has a chronic medical condition such as heart disease, pulmonary disease, or diabetes.



HOW TO PREVENT HEAT ILLNESS:

Seek shade and wear protective clothing.
Use air conditioning and fans where possible.

Prioritise outside tasks to cooler times of the day. Check in on vulnerable friends, neighbours, and family. Never leave children or animals in a parked car.






