BONJOUR! TO OUR NEWEST ADOPTED LOCKINGTON LOCALS

One of Lockington's great curiosities is the diversity of people who find their way to our little hamlet.

An excellent case in point is French travellers Leo, Pierre-Louis and Thibaut who are currently fulfilling their VISA obligations by working on a local dairy farm.

Remarkably, the trio all hail from the Marseille region of France (Thibaut and Leo lived two kilometres apart and have mutual friends) but did not know each other before arriving in Australia.

Thibaut is the senior member of the party at age 27 and has embarked on an Aussie trip as his last big adventure before settling down.

"I wanted to learn about a new country and culture before I got too old," he said.

"Australia seemed like the perfect place to have fun, it's not all that much different from Europe and easy to get a VISA and work."

Thibaut is a volunteer fire fighter who was previously working as a car parts salesman in his homeland and hopes to spend up to two years living in Australia.

He was in Melbourne for three weeks before a friend mentioned there was an opening for a worker on a dairy farm in Lockington.

Twenty one-year-old Pierre-Louis is also here for an extended stay, to improve his English while growing personally and professionally and learning new skills.

He studied real estate and property management in France and met Thibaut at a hostel shortly after arriving.

"Australia has such good people, it's a nice way to have a new experience and try a different life," he said.

Leo, 22, has a university qualification in International Management and is not new to travel, having previously spent five months in Mexico.

He arrived in Australia in November last year and worked as a waiter at The Pullman in Sydney and travelled to the Gold Coast and Coffs Harbour before heading south to Victoria.

"I have an advantage because I know what its like to live away from home and have experience integrating with locals," Leo explained, adding that he plans to spend two years immersing himself in our famous lifestyle.

"I had a friend who was working in Lockington which is how I came to be here.

"The days are hard, we work eight to 10 hours, six days a week but that's a debt we are happy to pay for the opportunity to visit a country like Australia," he said.

The boys are all new to dairying and milk almost 500 cows each day.

It's a long way from their hometown which is the oldest city in France (dating back to 600BC) and began life as fishing village.

LOCKINGTON - LINES IN TIME

Hello again everyone,

We have reached May 1911, as we look back at the early newspapers to learn how the local farming communities were faring.

Major developments, planned to take place in 1910, were to have seen closer settlement and intensive irrigation farming replace dry land cropping and grazing enterprises, on thousands of acres of land across the northern plains. However, though land had been acquired and work had begun for its conversion to an irrigated system, there was still much to be done.

It had been expected that the Bamawm Irrigation Scheme – of most concern to our district – would be ready for some of its new residents by March 1911, but now that date had come and gone. For the more westerly parts of the proposed Closer Settlement area, actual settlement would be delayed until after the Goulburn irrigation scheme had been completed.

In one respect the coming developments might benefit the longer-established local farming communities. This concerned the rail service to connect this district, and those to its north and south, with the main Bendigo-Echuca railway line; a service for which residents had campaigned, unsuccessfully, for more than thirty years. At last, it seemed the proposed line might be approved, due to the increased production expected to result from the introduction of irrigated farming to part of the region.

The Parliamentary Railway Standing Committee visited Cohuna, Elmore, Tennyson and Rochester in February and March 1911, to gather evidence relevant to the proposed rail link. Most of the residents interviewed supported a line to connect Cohuna with the main trunk route at Elmore.

However, a proposal to link Cohuna with the main line at Rochester also had its supporters, among them Mr Elwood Mead, the chairman of the State Rivers and Water Supply Commission. It seemed that he would have considerable influence in the eventual decision.

A conference of Railway Leagues interested in the proposed line of railway from Elmore to Cohuna was held in the Federal Hall, Gunbower, on 11 April 1911, adopting the following resolution: — 'That, having heard and read the evidence of the various leagues, this conference is of opinion that the line from Elmore to Cohuna will best serve our interest, and is already guaranteed.'

On 5 May 1911, the Bendigo Independent published a report of a conference of bodies interested in the proposed railway line to Cohuna, held on 4 May, at the Bendigo Town Hall. The mayor of Bendigo (Cr Wilkie) presided, and Mr W Honeybone, the Bendigo town clerk, also attended. Others present represented the Bendigo City Council, the Bendigo Chamber of Commerce, the Bendigo Stock Exchange, and the rural communities of Bagshot, Drummartin and Kamarooka; Tennyson, Wirrakee and Egerton.

Opening the conference, the mayor said that the assembly had formed to decide whether to support a connection at Elmore, or any other place on the Bendigo-Echuca rail line. Eventually, it was moved: — "That a deputation from this meeting and all interested, wait upon the Minister of Railways at the earliest possible date to urge him to remit the Bagshot to Cohuna route to the Railways Standing Committee for further inquiry; further, that this meeting affirms its belief that the recent extensive settlement on the lands to the north of Bagshot, on lands which had hitherto been considered worthless, will have an important bearing on any further report made by the Railways Standing Committee."

The motion was seconded and, after further discussion in which the proposed line to Rochester was condemned, the motion was carried unanimously. It was then agreed, moved and seconded: "That this meeting enters its emphatic protest against the proposed construction of the railway from Rochester to Cohuna, and pledges itself to support either the Elmore or Bagshot route, whichever may be preferred by the Railways Standing Committee after inquiry."

On the local scene, news from Piavella and from Milloo, was reported by the Bendigo Independent during May 1911. A very satisfactory trial of the 'Golden City' one-way disc cultivator was given in Mr W. Elliott's paddock. Despite the ground having been far too hard for the scarifier, the disc cut the soil beautifully. Mr Elliott was so pleased with the work that he purchased the implement on the spot. All those who saw it considered it the most-up-to-date disc on the market.

Piavella had heavy rain later in May, so that by the 25th, cropping operations had slowed. Then, on 14 May, Milloo lost one of its earliest settlers when Mr Archibald Spence passed away at the residence of his daughter, Mrs Wm Martin, of Tennyson. On 17 June, Mr John Lees, farmer, of Diggora, died suddenly of heart failure, at the age of 69 years. Like Mr Spence, Mr Lees was a very early settler of the district.

Other local news shows that intermittent winter rains failed to disrupt the district's social calendar. A district football association was formed, to include the Rochester Ramblers, Rochester Rovers, and the Bamawm and Diggora clubs. These clubs would play a series of competition matches during the season, for a trophy given by the president, Mr P Gorman.

The annual ball in aid of the Tennyson M. I. A. Hall was held on 14 June 1911, with thirty-five couples being present. Hare shoots were being conducted by district Gun Clubs, and Arbour Day was being celebrated by schools at Pine Grove and Warragamba.

The Wanurp school had been closed for some time due to an epidemic of measles there, but the Milloo and Milloo East schools were able to celebrate Coronation Day at a combined picnic in Worner Bros' paddock at Milloo East, on 22 June.In the meantime, there was further controversy surrounding the proposed route of the Cohuna rail link. We'll hear about that next time.

OBITUARY - BOB KELLY

Robert John Reynolds Kelly, known to all as Bob, was born to Bill and Ivy Kelly (nee Reynolds) on 8 July 1934 in Rochester.

Lockington proved to be an ideal place for an active young man to grow up. The town instilled a sense of community and provided opportunities to participate in multiple sports, including cricket and football.

He was a self-motivated individual who set goals for himself. He often implied, "if you want something to happen, it is up to you to make it happen."

The classroom was his least favourite place as a teenager, leaving school at the earliest opportunity. His first job was at the age of 16 in the local garage. He then applied for a job with the PMG (Post Master General, later Telecom).

Bob was a natural sportsman with a good eye, safe hands and quick feet taking part in the 1951 Lockington-Tennyson Football Club premiership.

Another premiership followed in 1954 with Union. In cricket he was a determined opening batsman and reliable wicket keeper.

In 1955 Bob was recruited by Rochester who were building the foundation of a powerful side to compete in the Bendigo League.

At age 19 he started dating Patricia (Pat) Pentreath who lived across the street in Archibald Street and after six years of courtship were married at the Sacred Heart Cathedral in Bendigo on 13th February 1960.

Soon after, Bob and Pat moved to Melbourne while Bob continued travelling back to Rochester for football

competing in premierships in 1958, 1959, 1962 and

He also represented the Bendigo Football League in 1958, 1959 and 1960.

It was at Aberfeldie that Bob and Pat chose to live, raising three children Trevor, Linda and Peter and being involved in their community.

Bob was involved with the Parents and Friends Association, Essendon Little Athletics, Aberfeldie Football Club, Our Lady of Nativity Tennis Club and Tullamarine Golf Club and later the Maribyrnong Park Bowls Club.

In the winter months Bob and Pat would pack up the caravan and head north to Kingscliff and later Woolgoolga to play lawn bowls enjoying the friendship of regular travellers returning each year.

Bob was a man with many talents. He was a celebrated sportsman, a progressive thinker and dedicated employee; a man who actively contributed to all community and sporting clubs with which he was involved.

Bob lived to 90 years with integrity, loyalty and friendship. A devoted man who would assist his family and extended family in any way he could.

He was loved by his wife, children, grandchildren and great grandchildren of whom he was very proud.

Although he didn't finish secondary school himself, he was impressed that all his children and grandchildren obtained tertiary qualifications. He always said he went to the 'University of Life'.

Bob passed away 12 April 2025.

Free seasonal influenza vaccine is funded under the National Immunisation Program (NIP) for the following groups at higher risk of complications from influenza:

- · people aged six months to less than five years.
- Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people aged six months and older.
- pregnant women (can be given at any stage of each pregnancy).
- people aged 65 years and older.
- People aged six months and older with medical conditions putting them at increased risk of severe influenza and its complications.







The field included a number of new golfers having a hit and submitting handicap cards - well done Jake, Harriet and Lou, we hope to see you back again.


